We are driving through nice dwelling areas.


























Here we take the evening at Rode Heath. This day was not that long, for now we are on schedule.




New day, Thursday the 14th of August. Nice houses here.

The neighboring houses to the pub.






The next day, Friday, August the 15th, Anne Berit feeds the ducks that meet the boat and waiting for food.





When we have done this round, we have driven 175 km and operated and run through 94 locks. Normal average time on this round is 55 hours, ie. almost 8 hours per day over 7 days. We did not note our time consumption, but it was probably about average.



Then it is time for food. Deborah and Asbjørn is making the buffet table.






Here it is ready.
