The city is known as an artistic town as many artists have settled here. Paul Gauguin lived here. <u>Pont-Aven brittanytourism</u>




The river <u>Aven</u> flows through the town.

The next stop was in Le Ménec just north of <u>Carnac</u> The place is best known for its long ranges of prehistoric stones. The plant is the largest of its kind in the world. It is dated to approx. 4700 BC and is considered the oldest building in Europe. There are also a number of prehistoric burial mounds in the area. The stone settlement is made up of thousands of <u>megaliths</u> that still stand there, despite the fact that it has been neglected and parts have been torn down by local farmers who over the years have supplied themselves to building foundations and others.








Then it was to drive to the hotel, <u>Best Western Plus</u> <u>Celtique et Spa</u>.






