
HELSINKI 1. - 4. AUGUST 2011



After having arrived to Helsinki in the afternoon the 1st of August and having walked on sightseeing the entire 2. August, We had planned to go to some islands south east of the city. There is a large fortification that UNESCO in 1991 put on the World Heritage list. It is called Sveaborg in Swedish or Suomenlinna in Finnish.

The construction is one of the worlds largest coastal forts, and has been called the Nordic Gibraltar. The construction consists of various islands in the approach to Helsinki, started by Sweden in 1748 as Sweden's most expensive fortification of all times. Today there are about 1 000 people living in the historic buildings and they have also a primary school. The domestic buildings were mainly built for Russian officers and higher employees.

The construction is a museum, which is placed under a independent department. <u>Link</u> to the official Web page. <u>The Naval Academy</u> is still stationed at Suomenlinna.

Suomenlinna's history is closely connected with the history of both Finland and the <u>Baltic Sea</u>, and the fortification has been an assumption for Helsinki to develop. The construction has to bee seen as an answer to <u>Peter the Great</u>'s foundation of <u>Saint Petersburg</u> inmost in the <u>Gulf of Finland</u>.








To get further we have to go through a tunnel in the fortification walls.
