

Asklepieion is an ancient medical center located 4 km outside Kos. It is from the first half of the 3rd century BC and it was built after the death of the famous ancient Greek physician <u>Hippocrates</u> in honor of the god of health and medicine, <u>Asclepius</u>. The characteristic symbol of this institution was a snake, which the Greeks honored because of its ability to choose healing herbs. The doctors at this hospital were also priests and there was also a shrine that was available to anyone who wanted to pray.


