It was just this one that had little interest for me.




The plants seem to bloom throughout the year here.



Gunpowder Magazine. It is originally from the Venetian period. 1204 - 1645, but it was rebuilt in the Turkish period, 1645 - 1898. Originally the building was used for storing guns and gunpowder, but now it is used as a laboratory for conservation of antiquities.

More of the wall around Chania. This is the wall around the Firkas tower.



On Talos Square stands this monument. It was set up in 1990 in memory of those who drowned in a ferry accident when <u>SS Heraklion</u> sank in the Aegean December 8, 1966 during a heavy storm. Over 200 people died in the accident.


From the Talos square we can see east towards the entrance to the <u>Venetian harbor</u>.

Several guys were fishing in the harbor when we walked past. This one got a small fish of 5 cm.


<u>The lighthouse</u> standing on the tip of the breakwater at the entrance to the harbor is one of the oldest lighthouses in the world. It was built by the Venetians in the years 1595 - 1601, but it was later modified by the Turks.



We look across the harbor to <u>the Gialia Tzami - Mosque</u>. It is the oldest Turkish building in Chania and it was built in 1649.



We walked through the entrance to the Maritime Museum of Chania, located in Firkas fortress. Here we look across to the <u>Firkas tower</u>, which is one of the most important places in Crete, because it was here the Greek flag was hoisted for the first time on Crete the 1<sup>st</sup> of December 1913.






We approached the lake down here.




The restaurants by the sea are closed during winter.

We drove further up. Here we see the northern part of the lake.




