
Above: Three Green turtle nests, made by the same female at different times, with protective cages on Toxeftra. Below: Green turtle nests on Toxeftra beach



Cages protect the nests from foxes. The new cages now used on all beaches allow the hatchlings to go to the sea as soon as they hatch, which is what happens in nature. Signs warn people not to disturb the nest – disturbance may lead to the death of the eggs and hatchlings as the structure of the chamber may collapse and the air (oxygen) present will be lost

Cages to protect nests from foxes. The new cages are now used on all the beaches. They are more open, so that they do not prevent turtle-kids to go down to the sea as soon as they are hatched. The sign warns people not to destroy the nest.



Turtle eggs at various ages. Translucent when laid they turn white after a few days as the embryo develops. The shell is flaky and breaks easily just before hatching. The eggs hatch after about 7 weeks.

Eggs of green sea turtle. They are transparent when they are newly laid, but becomes white in a few days. The shell becomes porous and break easily just before hatching. The eggs hatch after about 7 weeks.


The turtles have been protected in Cyprus since 1971.
