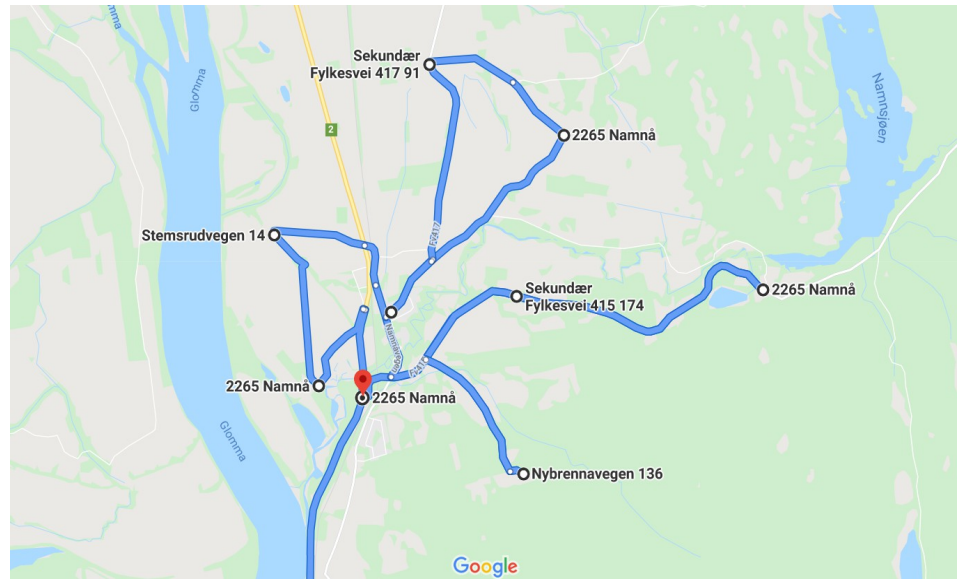
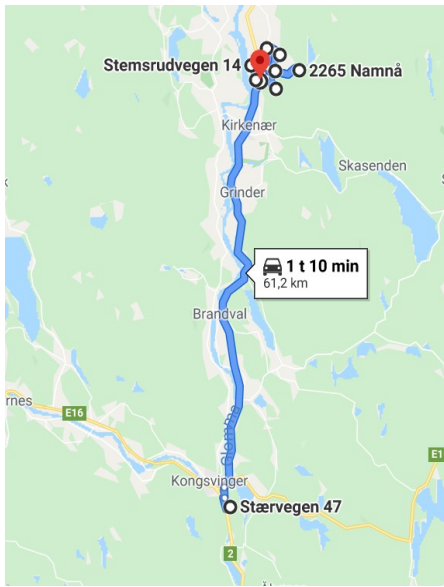


NAMNÅ

The old spinning mill (carding and spinning). It was built in 1929 and production started in 1920 and continued into the 1950s.

Harvester field.



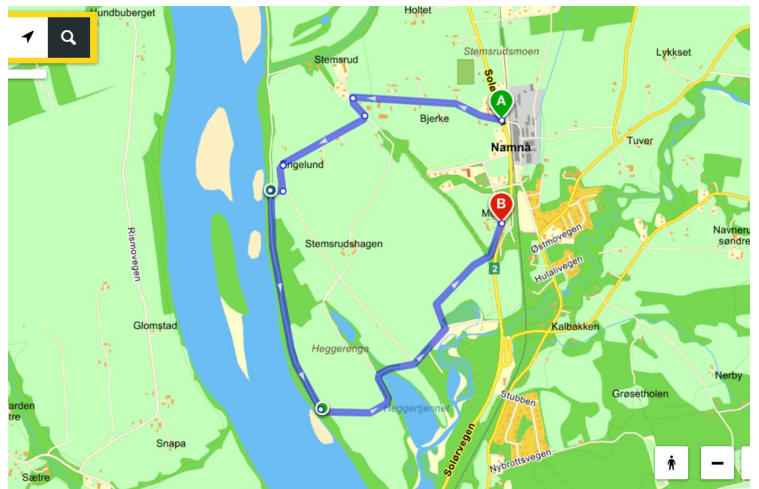
Kamphaugen. A lot of timber has been taken out this winter.
