After arriving in Rhodes on Sunday and familiarized ourselves with both the new and the old town, we continued the


exploration of the island.









Here we come to a big square before we proceed.




Before we go further, we see a relief of a Greek warship, a trier, which is carved out of the mountain. It's from the 2nd century before Christ.

This is a Doric portico that is partially restored.




The end of one row of columns.
