SAMOS 17. - 24. AUGUST 2019

We booked a last minute deal to Samos at <u>apollo</u>. When the plane leaves early in the morning we find it most comfortable to travel to Gardermoen the night before. We therefore booked a room at the <u>Park Inn by Radisson Oslo</u> <u>Airport Hotel West</u> and we reserved a space for the car at <u>Gardermoen Parkering</u>, which is right next to the hotel.

Here I check in.




This is inward.

Early the next morning we had some to eat for breakfast. Then we took the Shuttle bus to the airport. The ticket price was included in what we paid to have the car in the parking lot. The island is located in the archipelago called <u>the northern Aegean islands</u> off the coast of Turkey. It is separated from the Turkish mainland by the <u>Mycale Strait</u> that is 1.6 km wide.

In <u>ancient Greece</u>, the island was a center of <u>Ionian</u> culture and was a powerful city-state. The great mathematician and philosopher <u>Pythagoras</u> was born on Samos. So was the philosopher <u>Epikurus</u> and the astronomer <u>Aristarchus of</u> <u>Samos</u>. Samos produced a wine that was sought after in antiquity and is still produced.

Samos has been ruled by the Persian Empire, Athens, Sparta, Egypt, the Selev Empire, the Roman Empire, the Byzantine Empire, Genoa, the Ottoman Empire. In 1834, Samos became a partially independent state, but subject to the Ottoman Empire, Samos was united with Greece in 1912.

Business in Samos is mainly based on agriculture and tourism. The foremost agricultural products are grapes, honey, olives, olive oil, citrus fruits, dried figs and almonds, besides flowers. Muskatell is the most important grape. The island is also known for the tobacco industry and ceramics.

<u>UNESCO's World Heritage List</u> includes the sanctuary of <u>Heraion</u> and the <u>Tunnel of Eupalinos</u>, which is ancient engineering art.





The map to the left shows where Samos is situated.

We were to stay in Kokkari, which is northwest of Samos town.



Here we have landed at <u>Samos International Airport</u>. We flew with SAS. We had ordered food on board, but I found the food to be so poor that I didn't eat much.

Here the boats lie in shelter from the wind behind the pier.




There is a small beach here too.
