They had just eaten a pray.




Here are some that are fighting about the rest of the pray.


















They are lying just in front of the cars and are not afraid.











Finally they are walking away.




The next was a herd of gnus.


















This was the scenery, which we drove through.

The elephants proceeds right to the pond to drink.




Simultaneously the drivers are making gin & tonic.



Then some sunset pictures.






The roads are bumpy, so I have a firm grip on the rails.
